HEADMASTER'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR 1942

I am reading this evening the 127th Annual Report of the Bombay Education Society's Boarding School here at Deolali which has in all those years educated and trained many thousands of boys and girls. It is fitting to recall that the Society was founded at the time of the final overthrow of 'the Little Corporal,' who had plunged the whole of Europe into the misery and destruction of long years of war and was bent on the establishment of a new order. It may well be that we shall in the not distant future see the final destruction of that other Corporal and all his devilish planning.

For the most part, though we are now in the fourth year of war, we have been able to go about our tasks in that atmosphere of peaceful orderliness and freedom from stress which should surround the years of growth and development of all young things. Our greatest anxiety during the past year has been financial—that of finding income to meet the soaring prices of food stuffs, clothing and of other stores. I am proud of the way everyone has helped me; of my staff for accepting the inevitable postponement of increases in salary, of parents who have agreed to pay more fees, of the children who have learnt to do without. I would not have you think, however, that we are unduly worried. As others have found, so we have that lots of little things we used to think indispensable can really be cut out, certainly without harm, and sometimes, to our benefit. I doubt whether we shall balance our budget at the end of the year, but I believe we shall not be far out and that we shall be able to weather the storm and in any case we still can pull our belts a little tighter.

As I said last year, we are not in a position to do very much to help the war effort, but we have done our best. As a result of a boxing tournament arranged with the help of the Royal Artillery Depot we were able to give five hundred rupees to the local branch of the Indian Red Cross Society. At our annual sports we arranged several events for troops and only this last week we have come into contact with troops recently

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arrived from America. Our lady members of staff work regularly in the Services Canteen and our girls are knitting. We have made collections of books to send to the forces both in Deolali and overseas. I know of nearly 150 old boys serving in the Army, Navy or Air Force and am very glad to receive their letters. Two things stand out particularly from these letters. That the knowledge of Urdu picked up while in school has been of great value to almost all and I would ask the children here now to remember that. The second point is that many boys who never reached our higher standards or won many class prizes are doing very well. I mention this because it emphasizes what I have said again and again that education is not merely a question of acquiring so much knowledge, but a combination of that with the development of a disciplined, healthy body together with formation of habits of industry, honesty of purpose, and self-reliance. I must not forget either our old girls who are in the Nursing Services and the Women's Auxiliary Corps.

As you will have seen, the approach road to the school is under repairs. A year ago I should have had to apologise to you for the small inconvenience caused, but the maintenance of the road which was up to that time my responsibility has now been passed on to Government and the Garrison Engineer.

I mentioned earlier that fees had been increased. At the same time we have not been able to admit as many children on very low fees as we used to. It is our particular aim to provide education for as many as possible who cannot afford high fees and we make up the difference from our endowments and subscriptions. These have not increased while our costs have. The result has been a small falling off in the numbers of boarders though, as I say, it has only been small because one result of war time has increased employment.

We have at present 336 boarders and 43 day scholars. It is our day scholars who have suffered most, because of transport difficulties. Instead of running two buses to bring them to school, I can now run only one.

Our examinations' results for 1941 have been good. Nine out of twelve candidates passed the Cambridge School Certificate examinations and 21 out of 26 passed the Junior.

On the results of the Cambridge examinations, 1941, the following boys were awarded Government scholarships:

GERALD DADABHOY, Senior Scholarship of Rs. 30 p.m., tenable at any University, for four years.

REGINALD O'BRIEN, Junior Scholarship of Rs. 12 p.m., tenable for two years.

DUDLEY DAY, Junior Scholarship of Rs. 12 p.m., tenable for two years.

In the Bombay School of Art Examinations, five boys passed the Intermediate grade and eight the Elementary. In Urdu 12 were successful and in the Singing and Pianoforte Examinations of the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music all classes and candidates passed.

For the first time for six years our class work has been upset by an epidemic—measles—which spread throughout the school in the early part of the year and did not even spare members of staff. Apart from that the children have kept well and healthy. This has been an unfortunate year for my staff; two cases of measles, two of appendicitis and with our Hospital Matron and Office Superintendent both away for three months each. I am glad to report that all have now recovered and are back on duty and must add a word of thanks to all those members of staff who have willingly undertaken extra duties caused by these absences.

We have had somewhat to curtail our usual programme of games and sports owing to the expense of gear and we have not played so many outside matches for lack of transport. Everyone has had plenty of healthy exercises however and Inter-House tournaments have been keenly contested.

In class room organisation we have made some changes. In the whole of the Junior School boys and girls are being taught together and again in the top standards. In the Middle School however, there are still separate classes for boys and girls. This brings nearly to completion the gradual fusion of what used to be considered almost as two separate schools. It has taken a little time getting used to the new arrangements, but I am convinced it will increasingly be found beneficial in every respect.

At the end of last year our Chaplain and Senior Master, the Rev. P. W. Trutwein left us to join the diocese of Calcutta. As Senior Master I have been glad to promote Mr. Duthie and to move Mr. Barrow up to take charge of Mr. Duthie's old House. After an interregnum of some months, during which we

were helped out with our Chapel Services by the Bishop of Bombay, the Chaplain of Deolali and Father Whitworth, the Rev. R. V. L. Pereira joined us as our new Chaplain. We have also among us Mr. Seaton who walked a large part of the way out of Burma. Mr. Seaton had started his teaching career in the Diocesan Boys' School there before he had to leave. Another new master is Mr. J. Clements who comes from Jubbulpore. These last two have taken the places of Mr. Cardeaux and Mr. Anderson who left during the year to take up positions in other schools. There have been two changes among mistresses. Mrs. Roach who was teaching here for many years before her marriage has taken the place of Mrs. Trutwein and Miss Vickers who was educated here before taking her Teacher's Training has taken Miss Morgan's place in the Kindergarten. On the domestic side Mrs. Miller has re-joined in place of Mrs. Callaghan to help with the catering, while Mrs. Torpy has taken charge of the Preparatory House from Mrs. Stone who has taken Mrs. Edwards' place in the Senior House. I am greatly indebted to all my staff, teachers and matrons, for their hard work, co-operation and interest in the children.

I cannot end my report without expressing our gratitude to the many friends who have visited us, sent us gifts and shown their interest in various ways by giving talks, by presiding at our functions and by helping us out in our difficulties. Particular mention must be made of the late Miss Howard of Nasik who has sent us Rs. 200 for the last two years; to Mr. Watson who has become almost a fairy godfather and to a lady who wishes to be anonymous for a gift of two hundred and fifty rupees which we have just spent according to her wishes on 'Christmas cheer'. From Col. C. D. Taylor as O.C. of the Transit Camp, Deolali, we have received a magnificent silver cup to be presented each year to the best cadet.

In March the local Board of Managers of this school was re-constituted under the Chairmanship of the Bishop of Bombay. From all its members, both from Deolali-Nasik and from Bombay, I have received much help and encouragement. To the school, generally perhaps, much of their work is not known, but I can assure them of my grateful appreciation and of my hope that under their guidance the school will continue to grow from strength to strength.

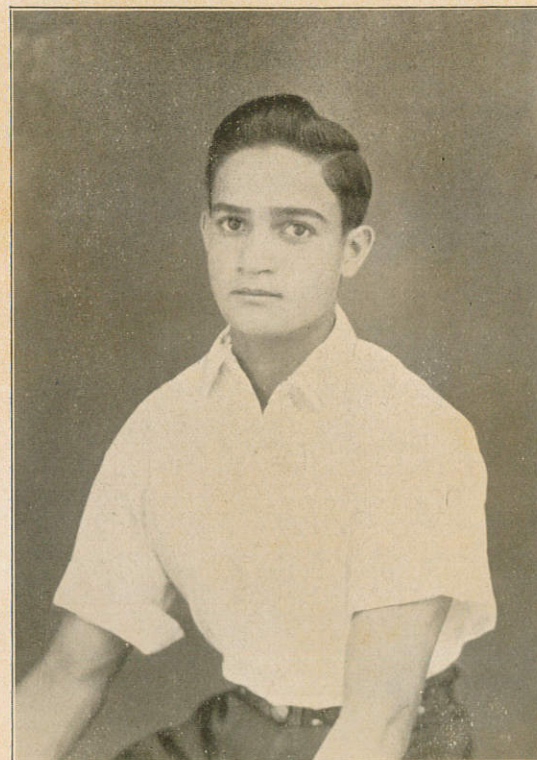
