PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT (Saturday, 18th April 1998)

Gen. Bhandari, Mrs. Bhandari, Ladies & Gentlemen, Boys and Girls,

It is my pleasure to welcome all of you to Our Annual Prize and Speech Day.

Lt. Gen. Bhandari was commissioned into the Regiment of Artillery on 11th June 1961.

During his long distinguished career, he has completed all the necessary courses with flying colours, throughout. Gen. Bhandari completed his M.B.A. in 1991 after which he was posted as Military Attache in Germany from July '91 to January '95.

On his return from Germany he was promoted to the rank of Major General and currently he has taken over command of School of Artillery since December 1997 on promotion to the rank of Lt. General. He was awarded the Vishisht Seva Medal by the President of India for his distinguised service rendered to the Nation in 1988.

Besides being proficient in most Sports, Gen. Bhandari is a keen golfer. He is also very fond of reading.

The Academic year for 1997-98 opened on 11th June 1997 with a strength of 1210 students.

The I.C.S.E. results were declared on 23rd May 1997. The pass percentage was 80.9%. Science still had a number of failures. However, there was some improvement in Maths. Rahul Pilkhwal stood first with a percentage of 90.

Regular classes were held even though we had the usual disruptions due to extra holidays being thrown in every now and then. The postponement of the I.C.S.E. exams by 15 days due to Elections being scheduled in March further threw a lot of things out of gear. However, with hurried changes and adjustments we have successfully reached the last event on the calendar on time.

In the Fifty years after Independence, Barnes School has stood strong and proud contributing our mite to the progress of the country. The high standards of honesty and discipline that we have maintained and the values of truth, honesty and fairplay that we inculcate in our students, help them when they go out into the world where many of these values do not exist. Hundreds of Ex-students return to visit the school every year and are extremely happy to be here again and express their deep gratitude for what they have achieved and attribute their success to what they have learnt here.

After India gained Independence, Barnes School was earmarked to be the National Defence Academy. However, the government was unable to acquire the school and the present site was chosen for the N.D.A.

There was a move to do away with English as the medium of instruction. This was challenged by the then Principal of Barnes School. Mr. W. R. Coles and Barnes School was awarded a landmark judgement and due to this judgement English still continues to be a medium of Instruction.

HEALTH

The general health of the students continue to be good. There were no major illnesses during the year. There were thankfully no epidemics this year.

WATER

Since the Cantonment Board has started adding to our water supply the water shortage has not been felt too much. We are grateful to them for this addition to our supply.

At this time I would like to remind all well wishers of the school, that the school is in need of a swimming pool. However, we do not have funds. I appeal to those who can, to please help in this endeavour.

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The school has enjoyed a very successful year of co-curricular activities. We have many such activities to busy our huge boarding of girls and boys.

The P. T. Gym and Karate was held on the 4th of August '97. Mr. Bharat Oza an ex-student and his wife were the chief guests. They enjoyed the evening immensely. Mr. Oza complimented all and said the standard he witnessed was much higher than in his day i.e. in the mid-fifties. He asked Mr. Sam Mistry, head boy in 1955, who was also present to join him in giving away the prizes.

The Soccer Season got underway with much excitement as this year we were to be the hosts for the Anglo-Indian Schools Tournament.

We won the Annual football fixture against St. Peters School, Mazagaon and then got ready for the tournament. The latter was almost cancelled due to torrential rain in Maharashtra at that time. Trains were cancelled due to track flooding in Bombay. Roads were flooded from Pune too. However, most Principals sent their teams down to Barnes and the tournament was started a day late. I am proud to say that we won beating St. Peters School, Mazagaon in the Final (2 - 0).

The Annual Athletics were held on 28th October '97. Maj. Gen. and Mrs. SJS Saighal were the Chief Guests. The events were closely contested. The highlight was the school team beating the Arty Centre team in the open Relay. No mean achievement. Gen Saighal responded by declaring two days holiday much to the joy of all.

The School Play was next. This year the students staged 'Jane' a comedy in three Acts. The students excelled themselves and Lt. Gen. and Mrs. Shanker's comments were that, "No praise was too high for the performance".

A group of Ex-students visited us in November and then again for the Fete in February. During these visits there were the usual cricket and volley ball matches and Socials for the students and staff. Their visit, all too short, ended with the ex-students giving the littlest students sweets and conducting games for them.

The term ended in December after the Nativity Play. This Play passes on a message of peace and love. The children of the Junior School who take part in the play were successfully able to pass on this message.

The Founders Day Chapel Service on 29th Jan. was a solemn affair. In the evening the students enjoyed themselves at a Social.

The School Fete was held on Sunday 1st Feb. '98. It was crowded and all those who attended had a variety of things to eat and games to play.

Cricket and Hockey are next on the agenda for the boys while the girls play Basket ball. The Cricket team travelled to Malegaon to take part in a district tournament. They however lost in the first match. St. Xaviers, Bombay sent down their School Cricket XI and played two matches against us. We won both here and then went and played them in Mumbai and won again.

Bishops School, Pune, sent down their Hockey team to play us. This was the first time Bishop's have been here. However, we won 4 - 3. Our hockey team went and played against St. Peters School, Mazagaon in the Annual Fixtures. We won handsomely 8 - 1.

Our girls Basket Ball team however lost badly 11 - 33.

The Junior School Concert was as usual well attended. In fact, the hall was packed to capacity. This attendance is great encouragement for your children.

The Junior School teachers attended a Seminar at the Leslie Sawhney Centre on communication. The teachers felt that they had benefitted a great deal from this.

The Council for the I.C.S.E. has introduced from 1999 examination, a sum of 20 marks for the Project assessment internally. Two Senjor teachers attended a seminar on the method of setting and assesssing the project. The two teachers then passed on all notes to their collegues. So from now on for class IX internal and class X external there will be 20 marks for project work for all subjects.

I shall conclude on this note - successful note, but before then I must thank all my staff for without their support and co-operation this success could not be achieved.

And last, but not least I must thank the Chairman, Mr. R. K. White and the rest of the board for their support, direction and advice that have helped me in all endeavours.

It is with deep sorrow that I heard of the sad demise of Mr. Duthie.

My association with Mr. and Mrs. Duthie at Barnes, goes way back to 1948, and even after passing out in 1950, my association continued in 1952 as a colleague when I joined the staff, albeit for a short period; I therefore, knew Mr. Duthie, both as a student and as a junior colleague.

Mr. Duthie, though a strict diciplinarian, endeared himself to all the students, and in his diciplined manner, inculcated in us a strong sense of esprit de corp, comradeship and loyalty, which is evident today from the overwhelming response at this condolence meeting, and also from the deep interest and devotion exhibited by the ex-students for their alma-mater.

Mr. Duthie had a deep understanding of child psychology, and it is only in our later years as we matured, did we understand the wisdom of some of his actions. He was quick to chide, but also gave credit where it was due. I recall having my prefects badge being taken away for a week and then restored with glowing tributes for taking my punishment in the correct spirit.

We owe our sportsmanship, team spirit and strength of character to Mr. Duthie - He moulded us into men, for which we will always be grateful.

May his soul rest in peace.

THE BOMBAY EDUCATION SOCIETY

Barnes High School, Deolali and Christ Church High School, Byculla.

The Crest of the Society and its Schools

From the College of Arms, London, we have obtained the following complete and authentic description.

It is a combination of the crest of Archdeacon Barnes, our Founder, on the left side, and that of his wife, who belonged to the Carnac family, on the right. On the left is a blue shield with the faces of three white leopards and on the right, four quarters alternately white and blue with crossed swords, three five pointed stars and a crescent. The swords are in their natural steel colour with the points upwards. The stars are blue over the white quarters and white over the blue. Similarly the crescent is white and blue. The bird is a white falcon with golden beak and legs. It is standing on a green mount with six alternate twists of white and blue underneath. The motto, in Latin, can be translated, "I shall arise with the strength I have received." This has a three-fold significance. In our school days and after, we rise to ever greater heights, fortified with the strength of body, mind and spirit which we have gained while in school.

HISTORICAL SKETCH

Just about a hundred years ago people began to think education for their children should be provided by Government. Before that there were schools for the rich. For the poor there were very few schools and those were mostly provided by the Church and charitable people. In the early 1700's many such schools were established in England. So it was that when the Rev. Richard Cobbe was appointed Chaplain to the Honourable East India Company's Factory at Bombay, he founded in 1718, in a building not far from the present Cathedral of St. Thomas in the Fort, a small free school where twelve poor boys were housed, clothed, fed and educated by just one master. That Charity school was the grain of mustard seed from which the mighty tree of Barnes has sprung.

A hundred years passed by. Another East India Company Chaplain, the Venerable Archdeacon George Barnes, realised that the Charity School could not possibly meet the needs of the hundreds of children then without any education. So he appealed for funds and started the Bombay Education Society in 1815, the oldest Society in the city interested in the welfare and upbringing of children. The first, small school was taken over. Numbers grew rapidly until it was apparent that new grounds and school buildings were essential. A large airy site at Byculla was given by Government. This time the girls were also provided for. New school buildings were opened in 1825. One of the copper plates commemorating the opening is now on the wall of Evans Hall, Devlali. The other remains with Christ Church School, Byculla, which with the parish church there, stands on part of the land given originally to the B.E.S. Much of the land was later sold to help build Barnes.

The B.E.S. Schools, as they were popularly known, were primarily boarding Schools for Anglo-Indians, boys and girls, mainly belonging to the Anglican Church. However, day-scholars were admitted and they were of all castes and creeds. For another hundred years there seems to have been little change. Then in the early 1930's the B. E. S. amalgamated with the Indo-British Institution which had been founded by the Rev. George Candy, about 1837. Byculla was by then crowded and unhealthy. Plans, initiated by Sir Reginald Spence and Mr. Haig-Brown, to move the Boarding part of the schools away from Bombay to the cooler and healthier Deccan Plateau began to take shape. A site of more than 250 acres at Devlali was purchased. On November 17, 1923, Sir George Lloyd laid the Foundation stone of Evans Hall. Less than two years later, January 29, 1925, a special train brought the first boarders to Devlali. With old time ceremony, in the presence of many distinguished guests, Barnes was declared open by Sir Leslie Wilson, Governor of Bombay and patron of the Bombay Education Society.

This short historical sketch explains much of the present Barnes. It is still primarily, a place where the poor Anglo-Indian children of the Anglican and Protestant Churches can be given a good upbringing and sound education. It is still a Church school where Christian ideals are practised and imparted. It is a boarding school, the largest in Western India. It has a long, proud record of service to the community going back 250 years. More has been added over the years and more still will be added in the future. The memory of founders and benefactors is preserved in the names of the buildings : Barnes, Candy, Spence, Haig-Brown, Lloyd. Other names are remembered. Greaves House is named after Sir John Greaves, prominent Bombay business man of the firm of Greaves Cotton, Director of the Bombay Education Society from 1930 and Chairman of its Managing Committee from 1939 to 1949. Royal House commemorates Harry Royal, an old boy of the B.E.S. school from the years around 1900 to 1910 who became an important officer of the Bombay Chamber of Commerce and Honorary Treasurer of the B. E. S. for many years. One name is yet to come - the greatest of them all, the Rev. Thomas Evans, familiarly but not irreverently, Tom Evans or just Tom. After being Headmaster at the old schools at Byculla since 1910, he became the first Headmaster of Barnes, without whom it would probably not have survived its early years. His portrait hangs in Evans Hall which was named in memory of him when he retired in 1934.

The meet came to a close at 1.30 p.m. after the Principal, Mr. A. Baker distributed the prizes.





THE GIRL GUIDES

Girl-Guides is an organisation that is well known throughout the world. It was founded by Lord Baden Powell in England in the year 1907. The guides met every Friday and were first taught the 'Guides Promise' which is as follows: "On my honour, I promise that I will do my best, to do my duty to God and my country, to help other people and obey the guide law." They renew this promise once every year on Independence Day

During the year the guides were involved in one activity or the other, a summary of which is given below:

There was a cooking session, where the whole group worked together and helped in making "Baisin Bhajias" - a testy snack which was enjoyed by all the members of the group. The ingredients, knives, spoons, cutting boards, gas-stove etcetera were provided by the school.

A Picnic to the Darna River was organised next where the children spent the entire day playing games, paddling in the water and eating a variety of food and sweet-meats. Some of the day-scholars brought more than enough home-made food and shared generously among their friends. At the picnic prizes were given for the varios games they played. A special prize was given to the best-behaved girl that went to Jyotsna Jha, the best leader - Miki Kurita and runner-up Namrata Goswami also received prizes.

Lastly, a visit was organised to "Maria Vihar", which is an institution that runs a hostel for working girls, has tailoring classes, type-writing classes and one section of the institute provides shelter for poor children coming mostly from slums. Our Principal, Mr. Baker, very kindly consented to provide us with the school bus and arranged for pastries, biscuits and rasna for our children as well as for the children of Maria Vihar. The cakes were baked in our school

bakery by the leaders of each group with assistance from the teachers. The guides themselves generously donated various articles such as clothing, shoes, books, dolls, hair clips and hair bands for the less priveleged children. The clothes which were laundered amounted to a suitecase and a card board box full. On hearing about our visit to this home, it was amazing to see how some of our little ones, inspite of them not being guides, contributed some of their bisuits and sweets for the poor children. These were Kalyani Gunjal from the preparatory class, Indaryani Gunjal - std. II, Varsha Nagwani - std. III, Bhakti Nikumber - std. IV, Pooja Nagwani - std. IV, Lorina D'Souza - std. V and Nisha Chauhan std. V.

At Maria Vihar we were met by the nuns. Sr. Sabina took us around the place. Our children were shown the dormitory which was just a large room where 47 childern slept on the floor. Within the walls were shelves where the children very neatly kept their bed-linen and other requisites. Later on we were shown around the dining room and the play room. It was here that our children mixed with the children of Maria Vihar, both groups entertained each other with songs and soon there was a merry chatter while all the children ate what was provided. The leaders, very systematically distribued the eatables and Rasana, taking care that no one was left out. By now the children of both institutions became more friendly and mingled with each other. When it was time to part the children of Maria Vihar sang a few sad songs, to show their love, gratefulness and sorrow at parting. As the bus drove out of the gates of the Institution there was a shout of 'good-byes' from both groups.

The lesson that was imparted to the girl guides by this visit was one of loving and caring towards others irrespective of caste, creed or colour. They also learnt that the secret of true happiness lies in being content with whatever one has.

It is neither considered old fashioned nor outmoded. In fact, even street theatres which are poorly equipped by way of costumes, properties and stage setting are as popular as ever. This is because acting is a creative art and creativity is an inherent trait of human makeup. In some it remains latent, in some it is subdued but in some it bursts forth in all its rainbow sued glory. It all depends on how the warp and weft crisis cross to form the fabric of one's individuality.

Right from the Nursery to the seniormost class, a great interest is evinced by children in concerts and plays. Every year the Junior school variety entertainment programme is the most popular function among the Junior school students, and teachers try to accommodate as many as possible when the senior school play is put up owing to the fact that the genre of the entertainment is different. The senior school stages Three Act plays which comparatively have fewer character roles, therefore, it is not possible to take as many as would like to be chosen. Incidentally, Barnes is one of the few public schools in India where Three Act plays of two to three hours duration are staged.

Debating, Singing and Elocution contests cast into focus many unnoticed talents which could be used for histrionic purposes then of course there are some who have already had the experience of facing the arch lights and traversing the arduous length of a Three Act Play in the previous years. So naturally Denise Mansey, who got the "Best Performance award" last year, and Mark D'Souza were the obvious first choice. The play "Jane" had nine character roles. After auditioning, the rest of the cast was chosen. These were Mark Hiranandani as Claude the page boy; Pankaj Hyalij as William Tipson, the butler; Denise Mansey in the title role of Jane, the maid; Mark D'Souza as Charles Shackleton (the hero); Cassandra Waring as Lucy Norton (Shackleton's fiance); Anupama Kamath as Mrs. Chadwick, (Lucy's aunt); Rhett Lewis as Mr. Kershaw (the elderly solicitor) Michelle D'Souza and Valention Almeida as Mrs. Pixton respectively, the couple running the baby lending agency. Stage helpers and prompters were also chosen from among several volunteers. These were Miki Kurita, Bunty Saha, Abhishek Parihar (who broken his arm while we were only half way through), Sikander Bholim and Suraj Chaugule. These children were understudy as well to the players.

Auditioning over, the actors were given a "feel" of the play for a few days by Mr. A. D'Souza and then rehearsals started in earnest. We usually start off with ninety minute rehearsals, gradually increasing rehearsal timings. Some days, towards the end, rehearsals stretch over four hours and more. Several players participate in other activities going on during the same period. So part of October and November is extremely busy time both for the staff involved and the children themselves.

One week before the final curtains, full dress rehearsals were conducted several times,

details looked into critically and minutely, final adjustments made in costumes and properties. As in other years, the only fear now was of the "slip between the cup and the lip" and we could only breathe easily after everything was over on the evening of 21st November, 1998.

The chief guest for the evening were the Commandant of the Artillery School, Lt. General Vinay Shankar and his wife Mrs. Chandralekha Shankar. The hall was packed to capacity. Some were invites and some had bought tickets, the proceeds of which go towards the building fund of the school. A portion of the original plan for the school still lies incomplete owing to lack of funds. The senior school play is not only a part of the regular curriculum but a fund raising effort for the school. Hence, a brochure is brought out on the occasion and parents, associates, old boys and well-wishers are asked to donate generously to the brochure. The school will complete its seventy-five years on 29th January, 2000 A. D. But in the annals of academic history, its inception goes deeper down into the depths of time to the year 1718 when Rev. Richard Cobbe, a chaplain to the East India's Company's factory at Bombay, founded the Charity School in the heart of Bombay.

On the evening of 21st November, all the participants, including the stage helpers and prompters put their best foot forward, bringing the many days of toil and sweat to conclude on a resounding note of success. Fears and doubts were laid to rest as the play picked up after the initial nervousness which was understandable. The audience supported the effort by responding well to the comic element conveyed by dialogue and situation, and Evans Hall constantly resulted with their hilarity, tones of for "Jane" was a complete farce - if ever there was a farce. Finally, it was "curtains down" to much applause. Lt. Gen. V. Shankar addressed the audience commanding the "superb" effort of the young cast and those in charge and spoke at length of the importance of teamwork and the dividend realised. Mrs. Shankar gave away the certificates. Mr. M. Thorpe, the Vice Principal, gave the vote of thanks. Denise Mansey, for the second year running, got the "Best Performer Award", but in our eyes that day, each player had "best performed". After the play, there was a sumptious dinner, for the invitees, the cast and staff members, who were involved with the function. There was a dance too for those who wished to really let down their hair down down after many days of disciplined existence - fro art does not only mean creativity, it means hard work and discipline too.






Practices on the stage began in earnest by the 2nd week of July. In order to arrange the actors on the stage and to bring in another element, that of music, Mrs. Waring and I requested Miss Mildred Verghese to help us, and she very willingly did so. She introduced and trained the choir to sing a beautiful rendition of Rabindranath Tagore's poem "Where the mind is without fear".

A number of difficulties began to crop up, as we continued our practice sessions. The formost of these were the "props" we needed. These ranged from Gandhi caps, dhotis to dummy rifles. Here Mr. A. Baker was a real help, arraning with army to lend us not only the uniforms and insignias of rank, but also the dummy rifles we needed. Another area where Mr. Baker lent a helping hand was with the marching of our "sepoys". They just could'nt march! Finally, Mr. Baker himself began to teach our boys how to march, stand at ease and to stand at attention, with their rifles.

We had a dress rehersal on the 13th of August. After the rehersal was over, we had a post mortem and identified many areas that needed to be improved. We have another long practice on the 14th of August, ironing out the main difficulties. On the 15th of August, at 5.00 p.m. we finally staged our play in front of the staff and senior students of our school and many parents who turned up to watch the show.

It was a resounding success!

I must thank Mrs. L. Waring and Miss M. Varghese for all the help and time that they put in so that the play would be a success. I also thank the Mrs. R. DeSouza, who helped us with various items of clothes we needed; Mrs. S. D'Souza and Mr. D. Correa who turned up to help us with the makeup; Dr. Daulatani, who sent us a complete set of clothes; Col. Budhwar who helped us obtain the uniform for Gen. Dyre; Mrs. Gurung who supplied us with the correct belts we needed for the sepoys; and finally Shri. Dattu Kakar who helped with the dhoties.





ON THE RED PLANET

AN EXTRACT FROM "MY FATHER DO NOT REST"

A broadcast delivered by Mrs. Sarojini Naidu to mourn the death of Gandhiji

I feel that sorrow is out of place and tears become a blasphemy. How can he die, who through his life his conduct and sacrifice, who through his love and courage and faith, showed that the spirit has the power greater than the powers of combined armies of the earth, the combined armies of the ages? He was small, frail, without money, without even as much earth as might be held on the point of a needle, how was he so much stronger than the forces of violence, the might of empires, and the grader of embattled forces in the world? Why was it that this little man, this tiny man, this man with child's body, this man so ascetic, living on the verge of starvation by choice so as to be more in harmony with the life of the poor, how was it that he exercised over the entire world, even those who revered him and those who hated, such power as emperors could never wield.?

It was because he never cared for applause, he did not care for censure. He only cared for the path of righteousness. He only cared for the ideals that he preached and practised. And in the midst of the most terrible disasters caused by the greed and violence of man, when the abuse of the world has heaped like dead leaves, dead flowers on battle fields, his faith never swerved in his ideals of non-violence.

He believed that though the world slaughter itself and the whole world's blood be shed, still his non-violence would be authentic foundation of the new civilization of the world, and he believed that he who seeks his life shall lose it and he who loses his life shall find it.

If we were indeed to believe that he is dead, if we were to believe that all is lost, because he has gone, of what avail would our loyalty be to him if we were to believe that all is lost because his body has gone from our midst? Are we not here, his heirs, his spiritual descendants the legatees of his great ideals, successors of his great work? Are we not here to implement that work and enhance it, and enrich and make great achievements by joint efforts that he could have made singly. Therefore I say, the time is over for private sorrow. The time is over for beating of breasts and tearing of hair. The time is here and now when we stand up and say, "we take up the challenge to those who defied Mahatma Gandhi." We are his living symbols. We are his soldiers. We are the carriers of his banner before an embattled world. Our banner is truth. Our shield is non-violence. Our sword is the sword of spirit that conquers the without world. Let the people of India rise up and wipe their tears, rise up and still their sobs rise up and be full of hope and full of cheer.





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

We should all contribute towards the setting up of small scale industries, so that they will be able to earn their living.

Only then will our country progress. We should think positive, and I am sure that the best is yet to come for which we should be ready to sacrifice ourselves, our time and our money.

50 YEARS OF INDEPENDENCE - HAVE WE ACHIEVED ANY THING ?

There are three ways in which we may assess the achievements of our country India, since her independence in 1947. We can do this firstly, by comparing her post Independence

state with her pre-Independence state: secondly, by assessing how far the aspirations of our people have been fulfilled according to the targets laid down in the successive 5 year plans: and thirdly, by comparing India's pace of progress with the pace of social and economic changes in other developing countries, particularly in Asia.

Judging by the second criterion, achievements have been far short of the targets set in the successive five year plans. The targets of doubling per capita income in 25 years is yet to be realized. A runaway population has yet to be contained and there has been failure to understamd the critical role of universal primary and secondary education.

mol abuse lagging lab nevel to the second section of the second section stagnated under highly protective tariffs and quantitative as well as qualitative controls. Public Sector based strategy of industrialisation yieded diminishing returns as public sector ventures have been choked by political and bureaucratic influences.

Genuine land reforms have not been pressed ahead, Zamindari was abolished but benefits of the land did not go to the tiller.

As compared with the pace of social and economic progress in other developing countries, India is certainly lagging far behind. The per capital income is far below the Asian standard. Even China, which has a larger population than India has a higher per capita income than India.

On the export front, low profitability declined our share of world trade whilst many countries of East and South East Asia were able to develop highly efficient and profitable export industries, as a basis for rapid growth of National income and employment.

However, with regard to India's present state as compared to her pre-independence state in my opinion we do indeed have something to celebrate, after 50 years.

After all, we have stayed united as a free country. We have also built a healthy, vibrant democracy. We may not have performed as well as East Asia economically but we have conquered famines and ended the economic stagnation of colonial days. The average Indian today lives to age 63 as compared to 32 in 1947, 52 percent of people are literate compared to 17 percent in 1947. We are now poised for rapid growth and a real reduction in poverty.

From a food deficient country in 1947, India has now emerged as self sufficient in food grains. Our industrial structure has been greatly diversified. We can now meet 80 to 85 percent of our requirements of capital goods through Domestic production. The country has now got a broad based and well developed financial system covering banking insurance and capital markets.

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The defence of India has made the country sound. On the space fornt also, India has made considerable progress. It has launched the polar satallite launch Vehicle and placed the IRS P-2 satellite into orbit. Taking into consideration both sides of the coin as presented to you by me, I am of the opinion that we have good reasons to expect that the lives of the majority of Indians will be better, fuller and more prosperous than their parents in Independent India.

Dear friends, on this hallowed day within the epochal Golden Jubilee year of our young nation's Independence, it is given to me, to express my considered appraisal of this country's achievements, since that portentous midnight on 15th August, 1947.

Five decades ago and after a long struggle, this nation of ours stepped into freedom and began looking ahead with hope and excitement, about the future. Jawaharlal Nehru, the paradigm of erudition, spoke about the nation's tryst with destiny. A third of its population precariously subsists below the poverty line-women in our country are subjected to the most inhumane atrocities; the status of the women continues to be a pawn on the chessboard of political chicanery; fissures in caste, class and creed spew their lava of violence into communal eruptions.

On pollution, India's record is dismal. Class I and Class II cities generate solid waste that has grown seven times, while the collection, transport / disposal continues to be unscientific and hazardous.

After fifty years of Independence, India's literacy rate today is a pathetic 52% lower than that of African disaster countries like Zambia and Tanzania. Our infant mortality is 70 per thousand against 4 per thousand in Singapore & 10 per thousand in Korea.

As the years have gone by, the dream of our founding fathers has turned into a nightmare.

What free India is seeing today is a naked rush for power and pelf. Ours is a saga of lost morality and lost opportunity. Ours is a society where there is a premium on dishonesty. Leaders and officials have enriched themselves and become more and more shameless in the manner of looting the nation. We felt rich in moral terms when India was born and held our heads high and were proud to be Indians. Today, that pride has gone. According to Transparency International, India is now the eighth most corrupt country in the world! Something to hang our heads down in shame!

We have Independence - yes; but freedom - no! Freedom does not just consist in shrugging off the yoke of an imperial power. It has to be diligently achieved. A nation is free, when its people are free from want, hunger, disease, violence, inequality and corruption.

As you can see from the confused scenario that is India today, something terribly rotten has entered our lives. Those that lead us have virtually failed. We have an arsenal of immeasurable resources in Strength, Courage and Conviction that can convert our Independence into true freedom. Otherwise, Independence is but an illusion.

We have hard work ahead. All of us, to whatever religion we may belong, are equally the children of Mother India, with equal rights, privileges and obligations. We should, therefore, pledge ourselves to co-operate in furthering our peace, freedom and democracy. And to India, our much loved motherland, the ancient, the eternal and the ever new, we pay our reverent homage and bend our knees again in lasting service with a prayer from Rabindranath Tagore's poem:

Where the mind is without fear
Where the head is held high
Into that heaven of freedom my father
Let my country awake

It signifies that the Government is wholly responsible for the welfare of the people. At present the Government is least bothered about the people. The leaders make solemn promises to the people before election, but after election these leaders become ministers and they forget everything. They only look after their own interests and those of their friends and relatives. In Independent India many people are still below the poverty line, lacking a roof over their heads, deprived of even a square meal a day, deprived of education and even the basic amenities like drinking water. All the promises made in the Directive principles are yet to be fulfilled.

Corruption is another problem in Democratic India. The ministers have formed a network of corruption. This means that if one minister is accused of corruption the whole ministry under him will also be found to be involved in the scam. Thus, we need rapid measures to eradicate corruption from Indian politics. Now and then media reports disclose the nexus between crime and politics. Social unrest and lawlessness on every front are also proofs of the failure of Democracy in India.

Thus now it is proved that Democratic form of Government has failed miserably in India and a rapid remedy for these ills is needed in order to really celebrate the fifty years of Indian Independence.

जीवन - एक असुलझी पहेली


