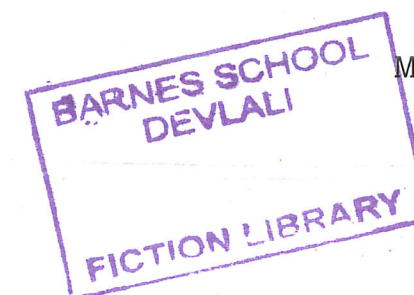

## Principal's Report for the Academic Year 2002-2003.



Chief guest Mr. Woodman, Mrs. Woodman, honoured guests, parents, members of staff, and my dear girls and boys-it gives me great pleasure to welcome you to this "The Annual Prize and Speech Day of Barnes School, Devlali, for the Academic year 2002-2003.

We are indeed very honoured and privileged to have with us here Mr. and Mrs. R.C. Woodman, Mr. and Mrs. Woodman are not new faces around here, but yet they are very special in a great sense of the word.

Mr. Woodman in his present capacity as General Manager of the Tata Conglomerate, in my mind, is a symbol of absolute success. I marvel at the time he is able to even keep aside for Barnes School work. Mr. Rudolf Woodman is not only an alumnus of this institution, but he is the present Honorary Secretary of the Board of Directors of the Bombay Education Society which runs this school, and which thus makes him all the more special. Being an ex-student of Barnes, Mr. Woodman is aware of his responsibilities as the Honorary Secretary of BES, in terms of seeing that this school progresses. Infact, he is very much into it, so to speak. This is evident from the very way he devotes his time on an almost daily basis, to find out from me over the phone or via e-mail as to how things at school may be faring. And that is not all, he readily gives his advice and suggestions as to how matters or problems should be dealt with. Mr. Woodman has been here from Mumbai on several occasions, planning and scheming, and always dedicating himself for the good of the school from behind the scene as it were. In a way a lot of the inspiration and motivation that eggs me on; the encouragement and support that I get, is derived from the very fact that I have able and dedicated Directors as Mr. Woodman. I must admit then that I am extremely fortunate and privileged in being the Principal of such an Institution with such a considerate and dedicated Board of Directors. Thank you Sir, is all I can say to you today, not just for myself, but on behalf of Barnes School-for doing so much.

I would also like to take the opportunity of thanking the directors of Board, in their absence the Chairman (Mr. R. White), the Honorary Treasurer (Mr. S.Daniel), and the other members for their precious time, dedication and efficiency by which they see that Barnes marches forward.

Behind every great man there is also the great woman-so the saying goes. Mrs. Lorraine Woodman



is no less. She has years of experience as a very able and dynamic teacher. I am yet to meet a lady as gentle and kind as Mrs. Woodman, I am pleased to announce that Mrs. Woodman has already so willingly agreed to be part of our drive to up-date our teachers on new methodologies in teaching. Mrs. Woodman will be giving a seminar to our Junior teachers on 'Teaching Skills'. That will happen in the new academic year. For today she has so graciously agreed to give away the prizes.

Thank you Sir, thank you Madam for sparing your time for being with us today. It is now time to give my report for the academic year 2002-2003.

### Academics :

The Academic year 2002/2003 - began on 11th June 2002, with 1240 students on our school rolls-of which 530 were boarders and 710-day scholars. This showed an increase of 150 students compared to the number on our rolls for the previous year. The year began on a very pleasant note, with the news that the results of class X ICSE examination held in March, 2002 were excellent. Of the 66 candidates that appeared for the exam, 65 passed; which thus gave us a pass percentage of 98.5%. 27 were placed in 1st Division category, 38 in 2nd Division category. There were no 3rd divisions. There was only one failure. Apratim Sahay topped with an aggregate of 91.3%. While congratulating this batch of students for such an excellent result, I would like to take the opportunity of thanking the teachers who were involved in teaching these students. Infact, it is without extra cost or charges that our teachers so willingly help the students of Barnes, especially those who are in the Board exam classes; in so much as giving extra-special classes. Let it then, not be misunderstood that our teachers are gaining any thing more than just trying to make sure that the students under their care do well. Teachers have given their time and have been ever so patient in helping each and every child. I am extremely happy about that aspect of the running of the school.

I am sure that candidates, who have just sat for the examination last March 2003, will do as well. However, I still maintain, as I did in my last year's report, and as always, the credentials of a school should not be judged on the basis of Board exam results alone, rather it should also be judged by all round and the wholesome education that it imparts to each and every child that comes through its portals. Thus, in that regard we here at Barnes can be proud of meting out such quality education.

For the academic year 2002/2003, we had 43 faculty members on our teaching staff. We bade farewell to 3 teachers in the course of the year-Mrs. L. Borle, Junior Hindi teacher, Mrs. E.Hardy-Primary school teacher, and Mr. M. Sequiera-Junior School teacher. At the end of this academic year we shall be bidding farewell to another 3 teachers. Mr. Alec D'Souza-the Senior Maths teacher, Senior Co-ordinator, and Block Master of Candy will be leaving us at a very ripe age. Mr. D'Souza has many years of teaching experience which has taken him from Darjeeling to Devlali. He has been with us since 1986. I would like to take the opportunity of wishing him well in his future endeavour. Mrs. L. Issac-primary school teacher is leaving us on health grounds. She too, has served Barnes for a very long time. She has been on the teaching staff since 1984. Miss S. Rao - the Junior and Primary School Art and Craft teacher also leaves us after serving Barnes for many years.

They go with our best wishes, our prayers, our love, and ofcourse, our sincere gratitude for having served the school so well.

This year we welcomed onto our teaching staff Miss Avantika Abraham, and Miss Bandana Gurung to our Primary section; Mrs. N. Chhabra as Junior Hindi teacher, and Mrs. R. Gosavi as the Marathi teacher for the Junior and Middle section. We wish them all the very best, and I sincerely hope that they will give of their very best in their new experience and association with Barnes.

The curriculum of a school is most often taken to mean more or less the same thing as a course of studies. But this really is a misconception. A curriculum indicates the entire work of an educational institution for the benefit of the student. Briefly speaking, the child has to learn some thing that will fit her/him for the society and the world at large. This is where Barnes comes into the picture.

Children have opportunities to take part in a host of activities such as club activities, Inter House activities, and on a higher level, Inter school activities. Besides that, boarders interact on the campus in so many different ways. I have seen many of them grow and progress quite rapidly. This has been very

encouraging and promising from the child's point of view, based on what I have just mentioned. However, it would be far more pleasing to see day students make use of the facilities we have to offer, especially with regard to extra-curricular activities. Parents must realise that there is so much more to education than for a child to attend school for the sake of classroom learning. I would thus love to see parents of day - students encouraging their children to be part of the school in a bigger way.

It is extremely important that children should participate in extra-curricular activities. People in our country tend to admire cleverness more than character. Yet every educationist believes that formation of character is the most important aim of education. One must realise that society cannot exist if man only possessed cleverness and no character. It is thus evident and unfortunate that in our country, character developement is found wanting. Another very important aspect, which helps character moulding, is the tone of the school or discipline of the school. The entire idea of school discipline has to be clear if it is to aid character building. Man is a mixture of good and evil traits. The good in him has to be developed and the evil has to be suppressed or sublimated. Let not critics point out that they can convince me any other way may be more sensible than this. Therefore, dear friends, it is imperative that we give children every available opportunity to develop their character. This can be achieved to a great extent by encouraging them to take part in activities of various kinds, and that is why, too, it so important for parents to co-operate with the school for the benefit of the child. In addition, Parents must spend more time with their children at home. Let it not be stated then that the school is solely responsible for the education or behaviour of a child.

From July 2003, I intend starting a PTA in Barnes. This, I am sure will go a long way in helping to understand that it is as much the parent's responsibility, as the school's, to educate a child. Therefore, the PTA should be a forum to inculcate co-operation between the school and the home, for the sake of the child, not otherwise. Hopefully this should bring in better understanding and results.

In September, 2002, Mr. B. T. Brooks who is a great educationist, held a seminar on " Teaching attitudes, and the art of teaching" - for our teaching staff. Teachers from schools in the Nasik region were also invited to attend. The response was very encouraging, and even more, from the teachers' point of view, the seminar in itself was enlightening and informative. I hope to organize more such seminars in the new academic year. Mr. Brooks has just under gone by - pass surgery and I am happy to state is doing fine now.

I would like to take the opportunity in thanking the Vice-Principal, Mr. D. Correa for a job well done throughout the year, to the co-ordinators Mrs. S. D'Souza (Junior School); Mrs. V. Thorpe (Middle School), and Mr. A. D'Souza (Senior School) for jobs well done too.

Coming to the teachers. Over the past year I have observed great improvements in the attitudes of children and their community life here at school. There seems to be a better direction of purpose. Children are far happier and contented, which has perhaps accounted for better overall academic results. This naturally reflects on the influence of the teachers. I am happy to state that I have been quite satisfied with the teachers' performance this year. However, still much needs to be done in terms of up-dating ones self on teaching methods instead of sticking to rigid ways. Teachers must learn to discipline students in effective ways.

Furthermore, there is a word of advice for teachers - to my mind the best kind of teacher is one who combines a certain sense of purpose with a certain dignity of behaviour. From a student's eye or point of view, it is the total personality of a teacher that makes a lasting impression. How often have we not heard students speaking gratefully of their teachers in later life ? They may have forgotten what the teacher had taught them, but the total impression that he/she has left in their minds remains through out their lives. The final estimation of the teacher in this regard will of course depend upon the teachers' abilities, the teachers' enthusiasm for his/her work and his/her earnestness in doing his/her duties. Thus, let us as teachers of this institution rise up to the occasion and do our best for the child who seeks education here. While going through a host of cards presented to me on my last birthday by children of this school I came across one which I still hold dear in my office. It reads - a pupil's definition of a teacher. " A teacher is someone who comes into the young lives as light to enlighten their paths. Someone who accepts the students as they are with all their weaknesses, thereby preparing them to face the challenges of life through patient toil and intelligent instruction. And this comes with a word of



thanks for always being there." How true !

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking all the academic staff for a successful year's work. I hope the new academic year will see more friendliness and better comradeship.

### **Sporting Activities :**

As is every year, the school has its seasons for games and sporting activities. The games and sporting activities that were held during the year are :

PT / Gymnastics, Football, Cross Country, Badminton, Table - Tennis, Athletics, Volleyball, Cricket, Basketball, Softball, Throwball, Hockey, Boxing and Martial Arts. Martial Arts is an added activity at extra cost for those who wish to take part.

Besides the inter house competition for all the games, this year I introduced cake tournaments for many of the games, by which winning teams were presented with cakes. This was done with the intention of giving children more practice time and to extend the season of that particular game. I must admit that this was a great success.

This year the All Maharashtra Anglo-Indian Football Tournament was held at St. Peter's School, Mazagaon, Mumbai. A total of 11 schools took part. Barnes eventually won what was labelled a very exciting and tough final against the hosts. Since Barnes had won the trophy for 3 consecutive years, the trophy is ours for keeps. Thank you Mr. J. Redden and Mr. S. Rayneau for training the team and bringing them up to an excellent standard. And well done to our football stalwarts.

Athletics is always an exciting event in any school calendar. This year the Inter House Athletic Meet was held on 2nd November. Dr. (Mrs.) Beatrix D'Souza, Member of Parliament, and a person who will always be remembered with gratitude for gifting the computers in our senior computer room, was the Chief Guest.

It was a day, unfortunately, that I had to miss as I was in hospital. However, the chairman of our Board Mr. White and the Hon. Secretary Mr. Woodman were here at hand to see to the successful running of the event. Beside the success of the event, in a letter to me later, Dr. D'Souza expressed her real delight and praise for the standard by which the event was held. She was also impressed by the school at large. I take this opportunity of thanking Mr. White and Mr. Woodman for their help at the time in seeing to the proper running of the event and playing excellent hosts to Dr. D'Souza. I must also thank the Vice-Principal Mr. D. Correa for officiating in my absence and for doing a fine job. Nevertheless, I was delighted to know at the time that our relay teams put up a fantastic performance beating all the teams pitted against them, including the army and air-force teams. Well done not only to the children for a great performance, but to all the staff who were involved - especially Mr. Adhav and Mr. D'Souza .

Ours Boys' Hockey XI performed well this year. For the annual fixtures they managed to beat Bishop's School, Pune, 2 goals to nil and beat St. Peter's Mazagaon 3 goals to nil. Thank you, Mr. Henderson and Mr. Adhav for training a very good team. The girl's Basketball team also performed well in beating St. Peter's by 45 baskets to 9. Thank you Mrs. Sharon Fredericks for doing a fine job. Well done to all the team members for their great efforts and for bringing laurels to the school. I would like to take the opportunity of thanking children who have represented the school. I would like to take the opportunity of thanking children who have represented the school in other competitions as well such as Debating, Quiz, Elocution and Dancing and also to all those staff, namely Mr. D.O'Connor Mrs. V. Shrivastava, Mrs.V. Thorpe and Mr. J. Redden, who were involved in preparing children for such events. The fantastic thing about our school teams is that they always have a habit of winning. Well done !

### **Domestic Department :**

The dormitory life of the child of a residential school plays a very important part in the process of the development of a child. Parents must understand that for many of those in boarding here at Barnes, this forms their home for most part of the year. Thus whatever they learn by way of keeping clean and tidy dormitories, keeping to schedules, etc., is of paramount importance in our endeavour to train the children to be independent and self-disciplined.

I am happy to point out that our matrons are doing a fine job. I would also like to appreciate the jobs being done by Block Incharges namely, Mr. A. D'Souza, Mr. B. Henderson, Mrs. L. Waring, Mrs. J. Dinger - who monitor every aspect of their respective Blocks to see to the smooth running of the dormitories and the welfare of the children. However, I would like to see the senior boys and girls being more involved in looking after the younger ones, being better role models in their dorms, and having a sense of pride in keeping clean and tidy dorms and good gardens.

At the end of this academic year we will be bidding farewell to a very senior Matron, namely, Mrs. N. Nair. She has been well liked by students old and new, and she will be sadly missed. Thank you, Mrs. N. Nair, and may you find new joy and contentment in whatever you do or wherever you may go. You go with our love and gratitude.

I would like to welcome Mrs. Monica Srivastava who joined as a matron during the year. I hope she will do her best in her service here at Barnes. Mention must be made of our hospital staff. Mrs. Gama, Senior Sister and Mrs. Mary Rajesh, Assistant sister. Many a time we have had to handle very serious cases of illness among our children. Sister Gama has been able to handle them well, which is why our children dote on her. Thank you very much Sister, for work well done throughout the year. Our thanks too, to Dr. Swadi, Dr. Patil and Dr. Pandit for seeing to emergency cases and helping out during other moments of medical crisis.

### **The school dining hall and kitchen department :**

In June, Mr. S.T. Borle retired as the Mess Superintendent, after putting in 23 years service at Barnes. I believe he had brought about drastic changes, especially with regard to the menu. He will be known for the varieties and tasty and pungent dishes that were served to the children. Not forgetting, ofcourse, the good old Barnes School daal, the recipe of which hasn't changed in years, no wonder ex-students still relish it when they visit the school.

I would like to take the opportunity of welcoming Honorary Captain Thomas Mathai, the mess Superintendent who took over from Mr. S.T. Borle, and Mr. Martin Bernard, Mess Assistant who are both doing a splendid job in maintaining the standard in the Mess.

Last summer the Dining hall was refurbished. Two new water filters were also installed. The Dining Hall is looking much better and cleaner. This summer there are plans to modernize the kitchen on par with 5 star standards. The bake in the Bakery will also be renovated. It is with pride that I dare to inform all those who are here that our school bakery produces the best bread in Devlali, and different varieties, too. Thus the importance of seeing that our bake is repaired on a priority basis. I would like to take the opportunity of thanking all those in the Mess Department for doing excellent jobs throughout the year in feeding and serving our boarders and staff. I would also like to take the opportunity of extending our thanks and gratitude to Dr. and Mrs. Bhatia, parents of Maithali and Vrishali, who are boarders with us, for having so generously donated 8 wall fans for the Dining Hall and 4 fans for the girl's study hall. I wish there were more such people with big hearts.

### **The Maintenance Department :**

Seeing to the maintenance and repairs on such a big campus as Barnes can be a mighty task, not just in terms of the number of Blocks and size of the campus, but in terms of the financial implications.

Last summer, a huge amount was spent on the Lloyd Block roof repairs. Among other jobs carried out were, refurbishment of the Dining Hall, renovation of Junior Block toilets, water proofing of Candy & Haig Brown block roofs, Evans Hall roof and the Principal's quarter's roof.

This summer a lot more work will be carried out, namely the renovation of Spence Block Dormitories and toilets, Senior classrooms, outsides toilets, exterior facelift of Evans hall, junior block, Lloyd Block and Haig Brown and fitting of solar heaters in the Dormitory Blocks.

Already the school roads have been re-paved and some of the wells deepened.

The money earned from the Barnes walk and The Annual Fete has gone towards such repairs. Therefore, the next time our school children come around to parents for contributions, kindly note the cause for which you may be helping. We need parents to be far more co-operative, benevolent, and

Thank you Mrs. Rosie DeSouza and your very able men who have been doing a wonderful job in seeing to the setting of each and every programme in the Hall in co-ordination with the maintenance department and for keeping the guest room spick and span, all the time.

A big thank you to the office staff, too, who spent a lot of their time keeping the records straight, as it were. Things are gradually improving especially in the Accounts Department.

A word of praise and thanks to the Security Staff headed by the Security Officers - Mr. Staurt Alphonso and Mr. Herman Pavey, for doing an excellent job in protecting our campus and other security matters.

I cannot end without a word of thanks and appreciation to our great neighbors the Army and the Air Force, for all the help and goodwill they render to us from time to time. Thank you very very much.

Lastly, but not the least, thanks to my wife, without whose support and care would make it difficult for me to continue with zest.

I would now like to spend some time with regards to what certain critics have to say about the moral and discipline standards at Barnes School, especially after the very tragic incident that occurred a fort-night ago involving our children.

It is pertinent to state that when any good is done, there are very few people who would be at hand to commend, but on the other hand when any thing bad takes place, the media and gossip mongers, as hawks, make it their right to know about everything, and ironically they quite readily give their judgement as to who is to blame. Such people have never seen the school functioning leave alone seen what it is like.

It is very clear that we at Barnes cater to the educational needs of people of all castes and creed. Children studying here come from different kinds of homes with different backgrounds. While it may be argued that it is the duty and the responsibility of the school to set up a standard of conduct of moral values for these children, it is also good parenting that sets a base for this to happen. While it is true that discipline is the final destination towards which the child must be helped to proceed to build a good character, this must involve co-operation between the home and the school. It is relevant to state here, that there are many parents who do not bother about ever coming to school to find out about the progress of their children. This is sad and very unfortunate.

One must realise that while the school will discipline a child and help the child to develop an ideal and a moral conscience, naturally, it is with this towards which the school tries to strive, the school cannot be blamed if it is not able to control external or environmental influences on a child's behaviour.

Let me state what Dr. Radhakrishnan, the country's second President and a great educationist had to say about knowledge and I quote. "Knowledge is power", they say; " but it is power only when it is based on experience of facts in relation with one another and with ourselves".

More Knowledge will not help us towards efficient behaviour in regard to our environment unless we are conscious of its value in relation to that environment. This is when fact becomes faculty. Only when this takes place that knowledge becomes power."

Well done to all those who have won prizes and awards today. And for the others, who did not make it, remember - it is always hard work that will get you there. Always remember, that your success is the best gift you can give to your parents and teachers.

May every one of you children have a happy restful holiday, and when you return to school I hope you will be rejuvenated and ready to put in good hard work. Remember wherever you go you are still from Barnes - your behavior and whatever you do will reflect on the training you get here. That is why you are the ambassadors of this school. You must behave in that way. God Bless each one of you and your parents.

## A Brief History of Barnes

Excerpts taken from an article written by the Late Mr.W.Coles, former Principal, Barnes School.

The origin of Barnes took place when Rev.Richard Cobbe was appointed Chaplain to the Honourable East India's Factory at Bombay. He founded it in 1718, in a building at St.Thomas Cathedral, Fort, a small, free school. Here 12 poor boys were housed, fed and educated. That charity school was the grain of mustard seed from which the mighty tree of Barnes sprang.

After another 100 years, another chaplain of the East India Company, the Venerable Arch Deacon George Barnes, realised that the Charity School was not able to meet the needs of hundreds of children without any education. Therefore, he appealed for funds and started the Bombay Education Society, in 1815. At first the charity school was taken over. Soon there were so many children that the Government agreed to give some grounds at Byculla for the construction of new school buildings. Girls were also to be accepted. The new school buildings were ready by 1825. Later much of the land was sold to help build Barnes.

The B.E.S. schools were basically meant to educate boys and girls of the Anglican Church. Later day scholars were added from all castes and creeds. This went on for another 100 years.

In the 1930's the BES was amalgamated with the Indo British Schools, which were founded by the Rev. George Candy, about 1837. Byculla became crowded and unhealthy so plans were made by Sir Reginald Spence and Mr. Haig-Brown to move the Boarding part of the school away from Bombay to the cooler and healthier Deccan Plateau. 250 acres of land was bought at Deolali. On Nov. 1923, Sir George Lloyd laid the foundation stone of Evan's Hall. Less than 2 years later, in January 29th 1925, a special train brought the first boarders to Barnes. Sir Leslie Wilson, the Governor of Bombay, and patron of the Bombay Education Society declared Barnes School open.

Barnes was brought into existence for the education of poor ANGLO-INDIAN Christian children. It is still a Church School, where Christian ideals are practiced and imparted. It is the largest boarding school in Western India. It has a long proud record of service to the community going back 250 years.

The memory of its benefactors is preserved in the names of its buildings: Barnes, Candy, Spence, Haig-Brown, and Lloyd. Greaves House is named after Sir John Greaves, who worked for the firm Greaves Cotton. He was a Director of the Bombay Education Society from 1930 and Chairman of its Managing Committee from 1939-to-1949. Royal House commemorates Harry Royal, an old boy of the BES school from 1900 to 1910. He was the Hon.Treasurer of the BES for many years. Evan's Hall is named in honour of Rev. Thomas Evans, the first Headmaster of Barnes. He retired in 1934.The school would not have survived its early years but for his dedicated work. He died in April 16th 1962.

### Barnes from 1926 onward :

The buildings were new and there were no gardens. The boys wore white shirts, blue shorts, and ammunition boots. The girls wore a blue frock, much below the knees. Topees were compulsory. There were two separate schools, and separate classes. The children's dining room was upstairs in the big Hall. The food was brought up from the kitchen by a hand lift. At lunch the staff had their meal on the stage facing the children. .

The A.I.F. Auxiliary Force, India, The Great. Indian. Peninsula Railway Regiment Cadet Company, Barnes School, having a strength of 2 Officers and 60 cadets, Officer Commanding Lt. A.A. Anthony, Second in Command, Lt.W.R.Coles, existed in the school from 1927 to 1947.All senior boys joined as soon as they were 15. They wore regular Army uniforms, and were trained by a Staff Sargent from the Army.They were issued real bayonets and rifles. They were the Guard of Honour for the visits of Lord Brabourne and Sir Roger Lumley, former Governors of Bombay Presidency.

As Independence Day dawned, on the very morning of August 15th, All A.I.F. units were disbanded forthwith by express telegram. So ended a phase of Barnes that will not return.

Mr.T.Evans retired in 1934, & Mr.W.Coles succeeded him as Headmaster. In 1937, the BES introduced the Employees Provident Fund. In the early 1930's the first Indian boarders were admitted, Hindi and Marathi replaced Latin and French.



## The war years :

As the Second World War began, the Army requisitioned a part of the school's grounds to form the new School of Artillery gunnery practice ranges. Devlali became a huge Transit Camp holding more than 70,000 men. Amongst these were Old Boys of the school who joined the Defence forces. Many Old Girls joined as nurses or joined the Women's Auxiliary Corps. From time to time there was the sad news of ex-students being killed or captured on active service. It was considered possible that planes from a Japanese aircraft carrier might bomb Bombay and Deolali, so as a precaution, blast walls, and trenches were dug. Teachers and children were instructed in first aid.

The Cambridge School Certificate allowed the children to write with a pencil with carbon copies so that if the ship carrying one set of answer papers were sunk, the other would get through.

Destruction and death touched Barnes. There was a terrible blast in the Bombay docks. Many orphans were brought to the school. Their fathers had been killed when on duty with the Fire Brigade. Three boys were killed by an explosion of a mortar shell which they had found just outside the boundary, and which they were investigating, at the rear of Candy Block.

There were also happy times. Mr. and Mrs. Fernandes were married. Mr. Fernandes worked for the BES from 1918 to 1924 at Byculla & from 1925 at Barnes until he retired in 1965. Mrs. Fernandes was a teacher from 1937 to 1964. Together they served the School for more than 70 years which is a record for any school.

The war ended in 1945, but the struggle for Independence went on. This only ended with the Partition. More than ever, Barnes became cosmopolitan, where caste, creed, colour, or nationality was of no importance.

## The 1950s'

Many Anglo Indians left India and went abroad where they settled down. Financial aid from the Government continued, but over a 10-year period this was to be cut down. The Managing Committee decided to continue to run Barnes. It was now peacetime and the school resumed to its normal routine. The number of children increased, studies improved, more children sat for the Cambridge examinations and passed.

The Silver Jubilee of Barnes was celebrated in 1950. Special bronze medals were struck and distributed to Staff and parents. There was a fun fair and a grand ball held in Evans Hall.

In 1954, Barnes went to court against the State Government's decision to curtail the rights of parents to send their children to schools of their choice. The Bombay Government passed orders that only children whose mother tongue was English could be admitted to Anglo Indian schools. The matter was finally decided in the Supreme Court; the order of the State Government was struck down. Barnes had won a landmark decision.

## The 1960s'

In 1960, all Government aid was to cease. The Managing Committee decided this. Therefore, fees had to be increased. The Board Examinations were now the responsibility of the Council of the ICSE. Mr. A.E.T. Barrow, a former teacher of Barnes School, took over as Secretary of the Council and later Mr. W.R. King also a teacher in Barnes followed him to Delhi.

The annual school magazine was started, known as 'The Barnicle', a short form of 'Barnes Chronicle'.

The 'Duck's Pond' was reshaped and enlarged to become the new swimming pool. A diving pool was also constructed along with dressing rooms. In 1962, Mr. N. Ferguson declared the new pool open; the Chairman of the school Managing committee decided that the School Shop, a Senior Boys recreation room, and the Library should be opened.

In 1962, there was the War with China and Barnes contributed generously to the Prime Minister's Defence Fund.

Mr. Coles decided to retire in 1968 and Mr. J.L. Davis succeeded him as Principal. During his tenure, the New Academic Block was constructed.

## The 1980s' & 1990s'

Mr. J. L. Davis retired in 1984, and was succeeded by Mr. A.R. Baker, who sadly passed away in Dec. 2000 while still in service. Mr. Baker was a popular figure with all who knew him, and organized the Platinum Jubilee celebrations, as well as the gifting of the MIG aircraft to the school by the then Air Chief Marshall A.Y. Tipnis. The celebrations were a grand success. Many old boys and old girls attended the celebrations as well as teachers who had taught in Barnes. Notable amongst these were Mr. and Mrs. King, who returned to Barnes after many long years.

Mr. M. Thorpe officiated as Vice Principal in charge of the School, and for a brief stint as acting principal, till Mr. A. Temple was appointed as Principal. Mr. M. Thorpe retired from service in Sept. 2001.

Mr. A. D'Souza, during his tenure was the Block Master of Candy, the Senior School Co-ordinator in addition to being the Senior Mathematics teacher. We wish him success wherever he goes.

## The 2000s'

In Sept. 2001 Mr. Albert Temple took over the reins of Barnes. Mr. Temple, has brought many innovations to the school. Value Based and child centered education is now the norm for Barnes. Seminars have been arranged for the benefit of the teaching staff with special reference to the visit of Mr. Bernard Brooks who conducted a two-days' workshop on teaching attitudes.

The Chief Guest at the Annual Athletics, 2002 - 2003 was Dr. (Mrs.) Beatrix D'Souza, M.P. She visited the school, and gifted us the funds to purchase 14 Pentium Computers for the school Computer Laboratory.

Recently the school has had a complete makeover. The main buildings have been refurbished, painted and repaired. Classrooms have been equipped with special 'Green Boards'. New furniture has been added for the comfort of our staff and students.

Mr. A. Temple has started a Parent-Teacher Association and many parents have joined in.

New subjects have been added to the curriculum. A popular choice is Commercial Studies. Another new subject is Home Science. Environmental studies has also been added to the school curriculum and now students can choose from subjects that interest them.

The future seems bright for Barnes. In a few years there will be a new academic block, Learning centre, equipped with computers and a new residential building to provide the residential staff with spacious living accommodation. There is also going to be a Chapel, which we hope would be an architectural marvel.

After an enjoyable dinner, Dr. Mrs. B.D'Souza bade goodbye to all, around 11:00 pm, as she had to leave early the next morning.

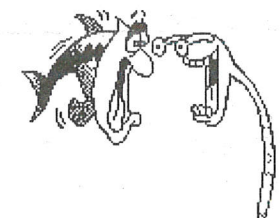

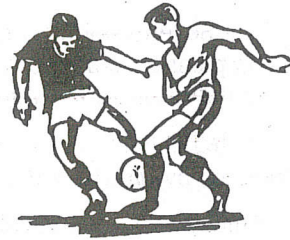

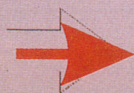

Spence house continued their winning streak and bagged full points for their team.

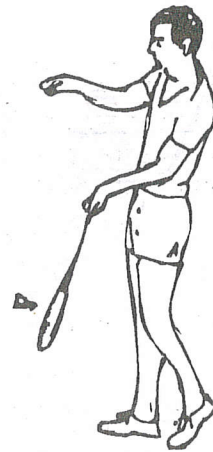

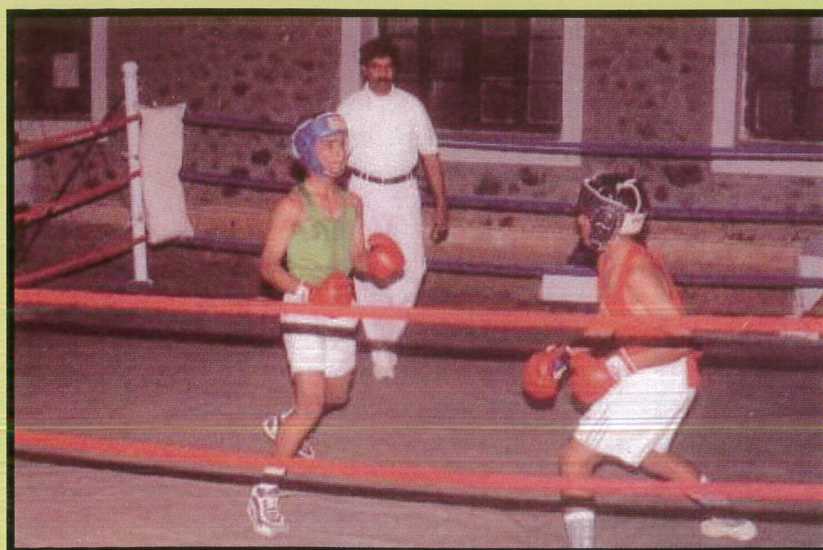

We keep hearing about many boxers on the international scene dying due to head injuries sustained in the ring, but so far we have had no such injury, because of head guards that our boxers are supplied with.

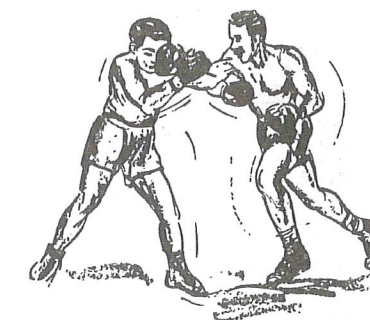
Another reason is that boxing generates tremendous enthusiasm and many a boy has an undying ambition to become "A boxer".

Amidst much joy and tears the matches came to an end.

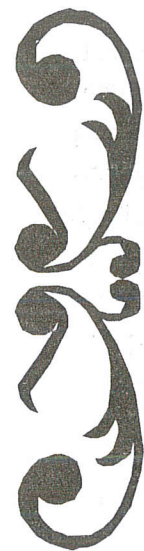

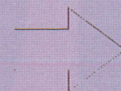

I was enrolled in a school called St.Lawrence. It was a French medium school, with our second language being English. At the end of the day, the points of every team would be totalled and the next day, one third of the school would get the first prize.

Imagine what all we can do with all this time?

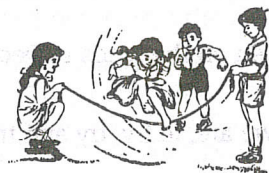
