

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2003/2004.



Chief Guest Mr. Ratan Luth, Mrs. Luth, honoured guests, parents, members of the staff of Barnes School, and my dear girls and boys; it gives me great pleasure to welcome you to this the Annual Prize Day of Barnes School, Devlali, for the Academic Year 2003/2004.

We are indeed very honoured and privileged to have with us Mr. Ratan Luth, Chairman of The Luth Education Trust which runs Fravashi Academy in Nasik. His hard work and dynamism has helped to create an institution of a high standard. Fravashi is one of the only institutions in the region which can boast of having the ISO 9001- 2000 certification of quality management.

As a student himself, both at school and college, Mr. Luth was a keen sportsman who won laurels in athletics, swimming, and even cricket.

Even though he heads Fravashi as its Chairman, Mr. Luth also holds an array of designations. He is presently the Executive Director of the National Association for the Blind, Nasik District; Director of the Managing Committee of the Lions Club, Panchvati, Nasik; Vice-President of the Nasik District Sports for Acrobatics/Gymnastics Association; Perhaps I could go on the whole day giving you a list of positions that Mr. Luth presently holds. Nevertheless, this speaks a great deal of a man who I know is not only hard working and progressive, but one who is packed with values of sincerity, honesty and friendliness. In a way, Mr.Luth is what one would call a personification of success.

I am also very grateful to Mrs. Luth for having so kindly and graciously agreed to be present here along with her husband, to give away the prizes and awards today.

Thank you Sir, and thank you Madam for sparing your precious time to be here with us.

Before I go further, I would like to take the opportunity of thanking the Board of Directors of the Bombay Education Society, in their absence, for their untiring effort and dedication in seeing to the constant progress and development of Barnes School. Mr. R. White – the President, Mr. S. Daniel – the Chairman and Honorary Treasurer. Mr. R. Woodman – Vice-Chairman and Honorary Secretary always make it their duty

to come to Barnes at regular intervals to see how things are going. Infact, very soon there will be new additions of buildings on the campus. And this is happening due to their sincere interests and effort to see that Barnes continues to march with the times.

I shall now present my report for the year 2003-2004.

ACADEMICS

The Academic Year 2003-2004 commenced on Wednesday 11th June 2003, with 1215 students on our school rolls – of which 523 were boarders and 692 day-scholars.

The ICSE (Class X) results which were held in March 2003, were a bit disappointing, in that we had a pass percentage of 90 %. Of the 79 candidates that appeared for the Exam, 71 passed.

While the Class X teachers tried their very best in giving special extra classes, especially to students who needed help; I must point out here, that there were many students who did not make use of this opportunity. While it has been our policy to give weak students a chance to give off their best, and to appear for the Board examinations, keeping in mind the need to give them a chance of making a headway, as it were, in to the future; many students have let us down. Infact, more importantly let themselves down. Students must learn to be grateful to teachers who do their best for them, in terms of sparing their time and energy out of concern for them to progress and perform better. I hope the present students will be able to realize this and make use of the many opportunities that are at hand at Barnes.

For the Academic year 2003/2004, we had 44 faculty members on our teaching staff. During the year we bade farewell to Mrs. Nirmala Rao – Senior English teacher who left us in January, 2004, and to Mrs. V. Thorpe Middle School co-ordinator and Mathematics teacher, who retired after putting in a record number of years of service at Barnes. Mrs Thorpe had worked here for 33 years. She will long be remembered for her very calm and friendly ways with both colleagues and students. Most of all she will be missed for her excellence in teaching. At the end of this academic year, we will also be bidding farewell to Mr. Julian Redden, Mrs. Shelley Redden, Mr. Stephen Rayneau, Mrs. Avantika Rayneau, all who taught at the Junior School level; and to Dr (Mrs.) V. Srivastav, a Senior English teacher who is also leaving us to become the new Principal of Boys' Town School in Nasik. I take the opportunity of thanking all who will be leaving us, for jobs well done. You go with our best wishes, our sincere love, and our prayers. May God bless you.

During the year we welcomed on to our teaching staff the following:-

Mr. Sandeep Sathe, Senior Residential teacher for PT; Mrs. Lakshmi Moses, Senior Maths teacher; Mrs. D. Bakshi, Computer teacher; and Mrs. S. Philips, Junior School teacher; we wish them all the best in their new experience here at Barnes.

A new block which is being called 'The Learning Centre of the School' will become operational by the month of October. This block will house the senior classes, the computer centre with CD and book library. It will also contain a High-Tech Audio – Visual Room.

There is a certain concept these days due to the very competitive world of employment, that only those who excel in academics will gain lucrative jobs or hold high offices. There is also an old pedagogical belief that a student was to be at work, only when she or he was at her or his books. Everything else was play, and it was supposed to interfere with the students' studies. However, it is a recognized educational norm these days that students at schools and colleges shall not be mere book-worms, but that they shall participate in the extra-curricular activities of the institution. It is a known fact too, that the non-scholastic activities of the school develop the social and moral aspects of the child, and that these are as much a part of her or his education.

The school must therefore provide ample opportunities for a student to be educated through the best means

possible.

With relevance to what I have just stated, I am proud to state as always, that we here at Barnes School provide students with great opportunities to achieve an all round growth both intellectually and emotionally. The past year has seen children take part in a host of sporting and literary competitions. There were Inter-House competitions in Football, PT and Gymnastics, Athletics, Cricket, Boxing, Singing, Elocution and Debating – to mention a few. Besides these activities there have been the usual Club Activities, the Junior School programmes, too.

Over the year, children were also exposed to Inter- School activities. The last year saw Barnes School win the All Maharashtra Anglo-Indian Schools Football Trophy once again. Our hockey, cricket, basketball and debating teams also participated in competitions with other schools. I would like to take the opportunity of thanking the staff involved in training the teams and to the children who brought laurels for their school. I would very specially like to thank the School Magazine Committee headed by Mr. D. O'Connor for bringing out the first coloured school magazine "The Barnicle" for the year 2002/2003.

A teacher is a teacher, but she or he is a more effective demonstrator, through hers or his personal life of values, attitudes, behaviour and performance. In keeping with our endeavour to constantly up date our teachers with new trends of methodologies in teaching, workshops were held. Mrs. L. Woodman was very kind enough to hold a significantly important seminar-cum-workshop for our primary teachers on the importance of the use of teaching — aids. The feed back from the teachers who participated in this workshop was very encouraging and positive.

In January the Lions Club of Nasik organized a three day seminar on "Adolescent Skills" which was conducted by Mrs. A. Bhatt. More than being enlightening, the seminar was a wonderful experience for the academic staff, in that, in a manner of speaking, it resuscitated their minds, in understanding the importance of dealing with the adolescent child. Today, it is necessary for teachers to build on better teacher-pupil relationships. Therefore, it is pertinent to state that this seminar definitely taught the teachers a lot as to how to deal with situations that they so often face in their teaching experience. I do hope that teachers have already put to use the many things that they have learned through these workshops.

At this juncture, I have advice for my teachers. We must persistently acquire new knowledge, learn new teaching skills and study new methodologies. We can not afford to be complacent if we are to exert proper influence on our students. A key element which influences us all, including teacher, parent and child, is our environment. It makes self-education on a life long basis inescapable. Therefore, our professional responsibilities must be carried out with utmost sincerity and dedication, keeping in mind the various influences on every child under our care. I would like to see a rejuvenation of sorts among the teachers, equal to hard work and dedication, in the new academic year. Accept change, especially if it is for the betterment of the child. I take the opportunity of thanking all the teachers of Barnes for another successful year in more ways than one. I must thank the co-ordinators Mrs. S. D'Souza – for the Junior School, Miss. G. Pinto – for the Middle School, and Mr. D. O'Connor – for the Senior School, for helping in the proper running of the academic departments. I would also like to take the opportunity of thanking immensely the efforts and hard work of the Vice-Principal Mr. D. Correa for his excellent work and support through out the year.

THE DOMESTIC DEPARTMENT:

I love watching the exuberance of little children, their energy, and of course their habit to drive one crazy. This I believe is a part of their being educated — which parents, please note. Infact, among the numerous aims of education, socialization of the child at school is one of paramount importance. Perhaps a boarder has more friends than his counter-part, the day-student; perhaps, also, a boarder has more to do by way

of activity than a day-student. All in all, the school society has a lot to do with the moulding of a child's character, and the imparting of an all round education.

I am happy to state that the standard of dormitory life at Barnes is being maintained well, and even more is improving.

Last year the dormitories and toilets in Spence Block were fully renovated. This year we hope to renovate the toilets of Lloyd Block. The Green Study Shed which many a student has sat in during his tenure at Barnes will be demolished to give way for the Staff Block of Flats. The shed will be re-built so that our Juniors will have a play pen, and seniors perhaps can have a gymnasium.

I would like to take the opportunity of thanking all the domestic staff: the Block Masters - Mr. B. Henderson and Mr. V. Frederick, Block Mistresses – Mrs. L. Waring and Mrs J. Dinger for seeing to the proper running of their respective Blocks. And to the Matrons too, for jobs well done. It is now so wonderful to see the lovely gardens in front of each Block. Keep it up.

Those in charge of looking after the welfare of the boarding child must realize that some times there may be nothing wrong with their minds, it may be their hearts that are broken. What takes to mend them is love. Your duties as matrons is to be as mothers. Let them be children – just look after them as your own children.

THE MESS DEPARTMENT:

The School Dining Hall is always the busiest place in a residential school – so said Mark Twain, because they can only be seen busy eating. However, it is also the place where certain standards are set with regard to manners and discipline. More important of course is the standard and quality of food. While children do get very substantial food and that too, well prepared food; much needs to be done with regard to giving children well balanced food. For this the Board of directors have nominated a dietician to look into the quality and hygienic type of food that should be served. Thus, the kitchen is being renovated and up-graded to an almost 5 star basis this summer. We will then be able to implement much of what I have just mentioned.

I would like to take the opportunity of thanking the Mess and kitchen staff for jobs well done through out the year. Special thanks to the Mess Superintendent, Mr. Thomas Mathai and his Assistant, Mr. Martin Bernard.

THE MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT:

This forms one of the important departments of a boarding school as this, due to its size and number of buildings. Through out the year regular maintenance must be carried out in order to keep our buildings in good shape. Last summer a complete external face lift was carried out on all the blocks. Shutter windows were replaced with glass pane windows, and the blocks were given an all weather paint touch up. This summer, the start of the construction of the School Chapel, the Learning Centre and the Staff Block of Flats will begin. These buildings are scheduled to be ready by end of September.

I would like to take the opportunity of thanking all the employees involved with the maintenance department for the good work they carry out from time to time. Special thanks to Mr. Basetti who has always been an obliging worker, and to his assistant Mr. Robins.

A special word of praise and thanks to Mrs. R. DeSouza and the workers of the Linen Department who constantly see to the maintenance of school furnishings, the proper maintenance of the Guest Rooms, and decoration of the School Hall for programmes as this.

One department in the school which is often taken for granted, is the Hospital. At the moment, Sister Gama is managing both the girls' and the boys' infirmaries. Through the years Sister has looked after each and every child very well, no wonder the children here dote on her. Thank you Sister for keeping up to your task.

A big thank you to my immediate office staff, Mrs. Swing, Mrs. D'Cruz and Mr. Kokne for their support and continued good and hard work. Infact, I think parents know Mrs. Swing more than they know me. Perhaps this is due to her involvement in seeing to admissions.

I cannot end with out a word of praise and appreciation to our neighbours, the Army and Air-Force for their help and goodwill which they render to us from time to time.

Last and by no means the least, gratitude to my wife whose support and care has helped me face many challenges and given me the zest to go on.

Discuss and find out all about your child. Do not leave it for the end of the year. You will find that by doing this you will be forming a pact between home and school, all for the good of your children. Finally I have a very important appeal, for those parents who like to pay school fees late, you are reminded to pay on time to avoid inconveniences and the possibility of your child having to be withdrawn. If you should have any problems with regard to your child, we at Barnes are ready to meet you and help you.

For all those who have won prizes and awards today – well done! And keep up the hard work.. For those who did not, you too may have done well – but the question is how well. You must work harder.

Have a restful holiday. Remember as I always say, you are the ambassadors of Barnes. Behave well where ever you may be or go.

INTREPID BILL

It was June 1944 when I joined Barnes High School, Devlali and everyone was talking about Bill. He had gone home for the summer holidays to Bombay and had stowed away on a US merchant ship, to sail into adventure. He was an avid movie-goer like all of us city dwellers and yearned to be like Errol Flynn.

In September / October 1947, we were enjoying the Michaelmas holidays. It was customary for friends and relatives to visit the school and bring us news of home as well as much relished tuck. Who do you think should swagger into his old dormitory, with a kit bag on his shoulder and a ciggy in his mouth, but old Bill.

Quite a few Barnes' Old Boys had visited us during the war, looking smart in their officers' uniforms. Usually after a quick chat with their house-mates, they were commandeered and feted by the staff.

17 year old Bill however, was a bit of an embarrassment to the staff, but a hero to the boys. That evening after supper, when he had made himself comfortable on my bed, which had once been his, and which I was honoured to relinquish, he told us this incredible yarn.

He had haunted the Bombay Docks during the holidays, checking out the merchant ships. It was easy for him to ride his bike around Princess, Victoria and Alexandra docks, as he had uncles in the Customs and the Police.

His choice was a US Ship, as the crew were more easy-going, the "grub" was good and they were desperate for crew, especially gallery staff.

Before he could say"Jaldi" he was bound for Europe with war supplies, and in late June 1944, he was anchored off Omaha Beach, a few days after D-Day.

Imagine the joy in Bill's heart. After thirty boring days at sea, cleaning pots and pans, he now found himself right in the middle of an Errol Flynn movie. There were warships everywhere firing salvo after salvo into France, while squardrons of fighter planes roared overhead.

He was not content to be a spectator for long. Somehow he got ashore, found an abandoned bike and pedalled along the hedgerows of Normandy towards the gunfire. He was picked up by M.P.s only a few miles from the front, sent back to his ship and told he would be shot if he ever stepped ashore again.

Of course we were incredulous, but when he pulled out this little metal "cricket" that went "tickatacka" which the paratroopers had used on D-Day to keep in touch with each other in the dark, we were hooked.

The ship's crew kept Bill under virtual house arrest and each time they visited some exciting port, they would lock him in his cabin. His ship followed the US Navy and the Marines through the Pacific campaign and he spent many an exciting leave in Hawali.

He and his ship followed the Marines to Okinawa. Then the bombs were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki and one morning in the summer 1947, Bill was anchored in Tokyo Bay. There were warships and supply ships everywhere. The centre of attraction was a huge battleship, the U.S.S. Missouri on which the Japanese generals and admirals would sign the surrender documents and hand them to General MacArthur.

One last challenge faced our intrepid Bill. Reaching into his kit-bag, he pulled out a copy of the surrender document. He explained to us as we listened open-mounted that every member of the crew aboard the battleship during the surrender ceremony, received one of these!.

From the Principal's Records.

REPORT ON 10 'A's visit to Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity Home.

October was just beginning to roll by when a casual discussion in class sowed the plan of visiting a home for the destitute in our minds. Our Principal asked us if we wanted to visit the Missionaries by Charity Home, founded by Mother Teresa and see how life goes on there. All of us jumped at the idea of going, especially after realising what an eye-opening and enriching experience it would be for all of us, so on the 4th of November we all left in the school bus, accompanied by Mr. V.Frederick and Mrs.J.Gurung, at 10 a.m. We all had our apprehensions about the outcome of a trip like this, but were careful in keeping them to ourselves. Our Prinicpal had also provided a massive container, brimming with delicious biriyani, cooked in the school kitchen, for distributing among the residents of the home. All the students had also collected some money to hand over to the sister for the expenses of running the institution.

After a short journey we entered the compound of the institution, which was small, but very picturesque and surrounded by beautiful gardens. One of the sisters ushered us inside and welcomed us. We were shown the way to a dormitory and it was here that we all had our first sight of the grim realities of life. As we interacted and talked to the residents, most of them very aged, all of us were shocked at the cruelty that life had bestowed upon them. One old man had been deserted by his family and had been living at the institution for 7 years. Another elderly resident had lost his entire family in the Gujarat earthquake. A third person had been abandoned by his own children on the streets. Such wrenching stories had us all reeling in shock, but it was very comforting to see that a lot of them cheered up when we talked to them, and some even cracked a few jokes with us!

We were then taken to the dining hall. Residents who were well or who could walk came to the dining hall., while others, too sick to walk, had their meals served in their rooms. After a short group prayer, a helper gave a short speech, thanking us for being present and for the food that we had brought for them. After the prayer, all of us pitched in to serve the food. As we went on serving, all of us went around and talked to an elderly person. His shy smile hid his shattering past. Here is his story:

He has severe diabetes and needs insulin everyday. He had been lured to Nasik by some people in his village in the promise of a job, instead they abandoned him. He was found half-dead, but under the sister's care his health had improved tremendously. He is going home soon and could barely conceal his joy as he related his future plan of taking good care of his blind mother and younger brother.

After the men had their lunch, we went to two other dormitories and spent time talking and listening to the aged residents. One of the persons living in the dormitory was a young man who wrote beautiful, heart-rendering poems. He was a victim of fits and expressed his traumatic past through his poetry. Reading his poems moved most of us to tears. As we moved around, all of us tried our best to comfort the patients who had suffered fractures or who were in great pain. More than the injury, they were more eager to talk to us and to have someone to listen to them.


After an apparently long time, it was now time to leave, but strangely, none of us had tears in our eyes, because these persons did not need our sympathy or tears, they needed our prayers and a short chat to enlighten themselves. Here, they were happy and content and lived with dignity.

We all got into the bus and waved our goodbyes to the sisters. The return journey was filled with discussions on the home and the residents . I, on behalf of XA, would like to thank our Principal for arranging this trip and a big thank you to Mr. V. Frederick and Mrs. J. Gurung for accompanying us. Thanks also to Mr. Borle, who very kindly arranged the preparation of the biriyani for the residents of the institution. This trip has been an excellent learning experience for us and also served as an eye opener. After this trip, our outlook towards life has surely changed- for the better!



Joan of Arc



St. Joan of Arc was born at Domrémy circa January 6, 1412. Citing a mandate from God to drive the English out of France, she was eventually given an escort to bring her before Charles of Ponthieu (later known as King Charles VII). After gaining the approval of the Church scholars at Poitiers in March of 1429, she was granted titular command of an army which quickly lifted the siege of Orléans on May 8, 1429, captured Jargeau, Meung-sur-Loire, and Beaugency in mid-June, and defeated an English army at Patay on June 18. After accepting the surrender of the city of Troyes and other towns, the army escorted Charles to the city of Rheims for his coronation on July 17. An unsuccessful attack was made on Paris on September 8, followed by the successful capture of St-Pierre-le-Moutier on November 4. As a reward for her service, Charles VII granted her noble status along with her family on December 29, 1429. She returned to the field the following year, despite predicting her own defeat. Captured at Compiègne on May 23, 1430 and transferred to the English, she was placed on trial in Rouen by a selected group of pro-English clergy, many of whom nevertheless had to be coerced into voting for a guilty verdict. Convicted and executed on May 30, 1431, she was subsequently declared innocent by the Inquisition on July 7, 1456 after a lengthy re-trial process which was initiated shortly after the English were finally driven from Rouen, thereby allowing access to the documents and witnesses associated with her trial; the presiding Inquisitor, Jean Bréhal, ruled that the original trial had been tainted by fraud, illegal procedures, and intimidation of both the defendant and many of the clergy who had taken part in the trial, and she was therefore described as a martyr by the Inquisitor. After the usual lengthy delay associated with the sluggish process of canonization, she was beatified on April 11, 1909 and canonized as a saint on May 16, 1920.

NURSE EDITH CAVELL 1865-1915 A Norfolk Heroine

The Reverend Frederick Cavell came to Swardeston soon after he was ordained. He liked Swardeston so much that he remained there for the rest of his ministry of some 46 years. While he was training in London, he fell in love with his housekeeper's daughter but they were not to be married until she had completed some extra education and thought fitted to the role of a parson's wife. In 1863, after twelve years at East Carleton, Frederick Cavell accepted the living at Swardeston. Two years later, Edith Louisa Cavell was born.

One of Edith's favourite winter pastimes was ice skating. Spring in Swardeston is still a spectacle of wild flowers around the common, although many species are disappearing (there were some 200 in her day). Edith had a great respect and love of nature and she seems always to have surrounded herself with plants and animals. Flowers were a fascination to her and she would collect and draw them as they grew on the common. She soon became a very accomplished artist .Both Mrs. Cavell and Edith taught in the Sunday School and acted as godmothers to a number of local babies, who in later years still treasure their signed copies of the Bible and Pilgrim's Progress.

Edith could never have known she was to become a heroine and martyr but she is said to have confided in a lighthearted way to a friend that she would like to be buried in Westminster Abbey. The first part of her impressive funeral took place there, attended by Queen Alexandra, Princess Victoria and many others from all walks of life with military and nursing representatives from many parts of the world. By popular demand, her body was brought back to her native Norfolk and lies at Life's Green in the Cathedral Close. The grave is well tended and nearly always covered in flowers. Among Edith's most treasured possessions were the roses sent by her nurses, which she kept in her cell long after they were spent, as a comfort and a reminder of the roses at the Vicarage in Swardeston.

NURSING AS A CAREER: In the summer of 1897, an epidemic of typhoid fever broke out in Maidstone. Six of Miss Lückes Nurses were seconded to help, including Edith. Of 1700 who contracted the disease, only 132 died. Edith received the Maidstone Medal for her work here - the only medal she was ever to receive from her country. Edith was recommended for private nursing in 1898 and dealt with cases of pleurisy, pneumonia, typhoid and a Bishop's appendicitis. She soon moved back into the front line of nursing and in 1899 was a Night Superintendent at St. Pancras, a Poor Law Institution for destitutes where about one person in four would die of a chronic condition. At Shoreditch Infirmary, where she became Assistant Matron in 1903, she pioneered follow up work by visiting patients after their discharge.

In 1907, after a short break, Edith returned to Brussels to nurse a child patient of Dr. Antoine Depage but he soon transferred her to more important work. Dr. Depage wanted to pioneer the training of nurses in Belgium along the lines of Florence Nightingale. Until now, nuns had been responsible for the care of the sick and, however kind and well intentioned, they had no training for the work. Edith Cavell, now in her early forties, was put in charge of a pioneer training school for lay nurses, 'L'Ecole d'Infirmiere Dimplonier', on the outskirts of Brussels.

By 1912, Edith was providing nurses for three hospitals, 24 communal schools and 13 kindergartens. In 1914 she was giving four lectures a week to doctors and nurses alike.

Edith often returned to Norfolk to visit her mother, who since her husband's death was living at College Road, Norwich. They also had holidays together on the North Norfolk coast. She was weeding her mother's garden when she heard the news of the German invasion of Belgium. She would not be persuaded to stay in England. "At a time like this", she said, "I am more needed then ever".

By August 3rd 1914, she was back in Brussels despatching the Dutch and German nurses home and impressing on the others that their first duty was to care for the wounded irrespective of nationality. The clinic became a Red Cross Hospital, German soldiers receiving the same attention as Belgian. When Brussels fell, the Germans commandeered the Royal Palace for their own wounded and 60 English nurses were sent home. Edith Cavell and her chief assistant, Miss Wilkins remained.

The initial German advance was successful and the British retreated. In the Autumn of 1914, two stranded British soldiers found their way to Nurse Cavell's training school and were sheltered for two weeks. Others followed, all of them spirited away to neutral territory in Holland Quickly an 'underground' lifeline was established, masterminded by the Prince and Princess de Croy at a chateau at Mons. Guides were organised by Philippe Baucq, an architect, and some 200 allied soldiers helped to escape. This organisation lasted for almost a year, despite the risks. All those involved knew they could be shot for

harbouring allied soldiers. Edith also faced a moral dilemma. As a 'protected' member of the Red Cross. she should have remained aloof. But like Dietrich Bonhoeffer in the next war, she was prepared to sacrifice her conscience for the sake of her fellow men. To her, the protection, the concealment and the smuggling away of hunted men was as humanitarian an act as the tending of the sick and wounded. Edith was prepared to face what she understood to be the just consequences. By August 1915 a Belgian 'collaborator' had passed through Edith's hands. The school was searched while a soldier slipped out through the back garden. Nurse Cavell remained calm - no incriminating papers were ever found (her Diary she sewed up in a cushion). Edith was too thorough and she had even managed to keep her 'underground' activities from her nurses so as not to incriminate them. Two members of the escape route team were arrested on July 31st, 1915. Five days later, Nurse Cavell was interned. During her interrogation she was told that the other prisoners had confessed. The explanation is that Edith simply trusted her captors, was glad to make a clean breast of it and willingly condemned herself by freely admitting at her trial that she had "successfully conducted allied soldiers to the enemy of the German people". Herein lay her 'guilt', and this was a capital offence under the German penal code. She was guilty, so they must shoot her. The German military authorities, having sentenced Edith and four others to death, were determined to carry out the executions immediately. A German Lutheran prison chaplain obtained permission for the English Chaplain, Stirling Gahan, to visit her on the night before she died. His account of her last hours is very moving. They repeated the words of 'Abide with me', and Edith received the Sacrament. She Said "Standing as I do in view of God and Eternity, I realise that patriotism is not enough, I must have no hatred or bitterness towards anyone". Edith was magnanimous in her death, forgiving her executioners, even willing to admit the justice of their sentence. This sentence was carried out hurriedly and furtively in the early hours of October 12th.

At first, Westminister Abbey was considered but the family preferred Norfolk. Her remains were escorted with great ceremony to Dover and from there to Westminister Abbey for the first part of the burial service on May 15th, 1919. She was laid to rest outside the Cathedral in a spot called Life's Green. Here services are held annually on the Saturday nearest the anniversary of her death.

A true assessment of her would be to recognise her as she saw herself - simply 'a nurse who tried to do her duty'. Her perception of duty challenges us today; in achieving the greater good (or the lesser evil), we may compromise our reputation and even endanger our good name. Edith, in doing what she considered her duty, was prepared to go further and surrender her life and liberty to relieve suffering and help others achieve freedom. She was a very brave woman, driven by a sense of duty, of patriotism, and by the practical living out of her personal faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. She would have wanted all the glory to go to Him.

Helen Keller: Triumphant over Adversity

At a plain, black well-pump in the small southern town of Tuscumbia, Alabama, one of the world's great miracles took place. It began one bright, spring day in 1887. Puffy white clouds floated overhead on a background of blue, while birds fluttered through oaks and maples and flowers burst forth from the fertile soil in an array of colors—all unheard and unseen by a pretty girl of seven.

Standing at the totally blind and deaf Helen Keller's side was a young woman, Anne Sullivan. Miss Sullivan was steadily pumping cool water into one of the girl's hands while repeatedly tapping out an alphabet code of five letters in the other—first slowly, then rapidly. The scene was repeated again and again as young Helen painstakingly struggled to break her world of silence.

Suddenly the signals crossed Helen's consciousness with a meaning. She knew that "w-a-t-e-r" meant the cool something flowing over her hand. Darkness began to melt from her mind like so much ice left out on the sunny March day. By nightfall, Helen had learned 30 words.

Helen Adams Keller was born a healthy child on June 27, 1880, to Captain Arthur H. and Kate Adams Keller of Tuscumbia. At the tender age of 19 months, she was stricken with a severe illness which left her blind and deaf.

At the age of six, the half-wild, deaf and blind girl was taken by her parents to see Dr. Alexander Graham Bell. Because of her visit, Helen was united with her teacher Anne Mansfield Sullivan on March 3, 1887. After Helen's miraculous break-through at the simple well-pump, she proved so gifted that she soon learned the fingertip alphabet and shortly afterward to write. By the end of August, in six short months, she knew 625 words.

By age 10, Helen had mastered Braille as well as the manual alphabet and even learned to use the typewriter. By the time she was 16, Helen could speak well enough to go to preparatory school and to college. In 1904 she was graduated "cum laude" from Radcliffe College. The teacher stayed with her through those years, interpreting lectures and class discussions to her.

Helen Keller, the little girl, became one of history's remarkable women. She dedicated her life to improving the conditions of blind and the deaf-blind around the world, lecturing in more than 25 countries on the five major continents. Wherever she appeared, she brought new courage to millions of blind people. Her teacher, Anne Sullivan is remembered as "the Miracle Worker" for her lifetime dedication, patience and love to a half-wild southern child trapped in a world of darkness.

Florence Nightingale

Florence Nightingale was a legend in her lifetime but the Crimean War years which made her famous were just two out of a life of ninety years.

Florence Nightingale was born in Italy on 12 May, 1820 and was named Florence after the city where she was born. Her parents, William Edward and Frances Nightingale were a wealthy couple, who had toured Europe for two years on their honeymoon.

Florence grew up to be a lively and attractive young woman, admired in the family's social circle and she was expected to make a good marriage, but Florence had other concerns. In 1837, whilst in the gardens at Embley, Florence had what she described as her 'calling'. Florence heard the voice of God calling her to do his work, but at this time she had no idea what that work would be.

The Crimean War

In March 1854 Britain, France and Turkey declared war on Russia. The allies defeated the Russians at the battle of the Alma in September but reports in The Times criticised the British medical facilities for the wounded. In response, Sidney Herbert, the Minister at War, who knew Florence Nightingale socially and through her work at Harley Street, appointed her to oversee the introduction of female nurses into the military hospitals in Turkey. On 4 November 1854, Florence Nightingale arrived at the Barrack Hospital in Scutari, a suburb on the Asian side of Constantinople, with the party of 38 nurses. Initially the doctors did not want the nurses there and did not ask for their help, but within ten days fresh casualties arrived from the battle of Inkermann and the nurses were fully stretched. The 'Lady-in-Chief', as Florence was called, wrote home on behalf of the soldiers. She acted as a banker, sending the men's wages home to their families, and introduced reading rooms to the hospital. In return she gained the undying respect of the British soldiers. The introduction of female nurses to the military hospitals was an outstanding success, and to show the nation's gratitude for Florence Nightingale's hard work a public subscription was organised in November, 1855. The money collected was to enable Florence Nightingale to continue her reform of nursing in the civil hospitals of Britain.

Nightingale Training School for Nurses:

Florence Nightingale's greatest achievement was to raise nursing to the level of a respectable profession for women. In 1860, with the public subscriptions of the Nightingale Fund, she established the Nightingale Training School for nurses at St Thomas' Hospital.

From 1872 Florence Nightingale devoted closer attention to the organisation of the School and almost annually for the next thirty years she wrote an open letter to the nurses and probationers giving advice and encouragement. On completion of training Florence Nightingale gave the nurses books and invited them to tea. Once trained the nurses were sent to staff hospitals in Britain and abroad and to established nursing training schools on the Nightingale model. In 1860 her best known work, *Notes on Nursing*, was published. It laid down the principles of nursing: careful observation and sensitivity to the patient's needs. *Notes on Nursing* has been translated into eleven foreign languages and is still in print today.




