

INTERVIEW WITH MR. KAISAR DOPAISHI

EX-STUDENTS INTERVIEW - KIMAYA AND HIMANISH

SCIENCE FACTS



1. Oceans Produce Most of Earth's Oxygen

More than half of the world's oxygen is produced by plankton, seaweed, and other photosynthesizing organisms in the oceans.

2. Soil Teems with Life

There are more microorganisms in one teaspoon of soil than people on the planet. Millions of species and billions of organisms like bacteria, algae, insects, worms, and fungi represent the highest concentration of biomass anywhere on Earth.Water Can Exist as Solid, Liquid and Gas Simultaneously

This is known as the triple point, the temperature and pressure at which water can exist in all three states at once.

3. Helium Can Defy Gravity

When cooled to near absolute zero, helium becomes a superfluid that can flow without friction, allowing it to climb upwards against gravity. Bananas Contain Radioactive Potassium

Bananas contain small amounts of potassium-40, a radioactive isotope. However, you'd need to eat 10 million bananas in one sitting to suffer radiation poisoning.

4. Hot Water Can Freeze Faster Than Cold

This surprising phenomenon is called the Mpemba effect. Hot water may freeze faster because the velocities of its particles allow them to coalesce more readily into an ice crystal structure.
